"While looking at Italian Renaissance arts, what attracts us the most is probably their seemingly impeccable formal beauty and supreme spiritual ideology. Less evident is, however, their political significance that was often carefully hidden underneath the object's form and subject matter. Recently, scholars have noted the socio-political agency of Renaissance paintings and sculpture beyond their aesthetic value. Following this approach, today's talk aims to address the "invisible" political meaning of Renaissance artwork by positioning them in their original spatial-temporal context."
